**Meeting called to order** at 12:02 p.m.

**Public Comments regarding Agenda items:** None.

**Review/Discussion/Action – Minutes of the June 15, 2022:** Ms. Campbell-Wood requested clarification be made on a statement she made in the meeting minutes. Ms. Berning made the change as suggested. Ms. Hanson inquired if subcommittee attendance was correct, Ms. Berning confirmed it was. Ms. Campbell-Wood accepted motion to approve minutes as presented, seconded by Mr. Schmidtknecht. Motion carried.

**CJCC BY-LAWS:** Ms. Hansen suggested the committee go through the CJCC Membership list and identify names of those individuals who have voting privileges. This will be addressed at the next CJCC Meeting. She pointed out there is currently **no** Pepin County Board representative on the CJCC Committee, and this will be added to the agenda at the next Pepin County Board Meeting. Ms. Campbell-Wood would like the CJCC Committee to review the CJCC mission/vision statements. She is willing to be the lead this task and will bring back to the committee in September/October 2022. Ms. Berning informed the committee the CJS Steering Committee has not met for a couple of years as there has not been a need. If the pre-charge program is funded in 2023 this committee will be reestablished, and Ms. Berning will see who would be interested in participating.

**CJCC RESOLUTION:** Judge Clark stated the CJCC by-laws establishes parameters as to how the counsel collaborates.

**CJCC Practices/Role/Purpose:** Judge Clark stated the by-laws in place cover the practices, roles, and purposes. All meetings are open to foster ideas which is why there is an agenda so committee members can bring ideas ahead of time. System mapping would be an appropriate project for the CJCC Committee to work on. Ms. Hansen discussed the raw data received and what it all means. Further discussion about evidence-based practices, recidivism, prevention, and the ability to identify the small steps both quantitative and qualitative was shared amongst the committee members.

**CJCC Role regarding TAD Funding:** Mr. Brooks was going to do research on this topic. He was absent from the meeting. Ms. Berning filled in providing the TAD statute that outlines a county receiving a TAD grant shall create an oversight committee and it identifies who the representative should be which is outlined in the CJCC By-Laws. Buffalo/Pepin County has defined the CJS oversight committee to be CJCC. Ms. Berning also discussed the match/cost sharing requirement of 25% cash match which is required for all projects funded under this program area. The source of cash match must be local funds and may be in form of direct contributions of county employees' time, benefits, facilities, or supplies and service that have a direct financial impact on the program and its operations and management.

**CJCC Financial Guidelines:** Judge Clark stated if the CJCC Committee thinks there needs to be specific guidelines of the best way to use the CJCC funds than the committee can work on that or provide a general guideline of spending within the mission statement. He also stated it is not a good idea to spend the fund, just to spend it. If there are reasons to spend put the topic on the agenda and the committee will discuss at the next meeting.

**Reports:** Ms. Campbell-Wood commented on the Moving Forward Program offering 4 – 6 classes per month in both county jails. Excellent participation in Buffalo County Jail. Was able to provide \$4,600 to Buffalo County to purchase teleconference equipment and installment.

**BY-LAWS**

**Article I: Mission and Vision**

Mission Statement

Improve the criminal justice system to enhance public safety, reduce recidivism, and enrich lives through collaboration, community involvement and resource utilization.

Vision Statement

A cooperative, coordinated effort to effectively change behavior by accurately assessing and addressing risks and needs that leads to re-offending.

**Article II: Authority of the CJCC**

The CJCC holds no legal authority to order changes to either county's criminal justice system but it may bring about changes through consensus by the participating agencies and branches. The Council reviews policies, programs and budgets within the criminal justice system and makes final recommendations to all justice system partners, and County Boards/Committees.

The CJCC has no authority to order changes or direct the operations of any County Board or County department responsibilities.

**Article III: Structure**

**Section A: CJCC Membership**

There are up to twenty-three members of the council who are members due to the position they hold. These individuals serve on the Council for as long as they occupy the position entitling them to membership with voting privileges and for determining a quorum. All members listed below shall be permanent members of this CJCC, unless removed by a Council vote of two-thirds or more of the members present at a scheduled Council meeting for cause. Members include the following from each County:

- Circuit Court Judge
- County Board Representative from each County, or other County Board designee
- Sheriff, or designee from each County
- District Attorney from each County
- State Public Defender from each County
- Clerk of Circuit Court from each County

- Probation Supervisor, or designee
- Director of Buffalo County Department of Health and Human Services, or designee
- Director of Pepin County Department of Health, or designee
- Director of Pepin County Department of Human Services, or designee
- Victim Witness Coordinator from each County
- Citizen representative from each County, appointed by the CJCC Board
- Wisconsin Works, private social service, mental health and substance abuse agencies serving the two Counties
- Representative from U. W. Madison Division of Extension
- The offender, appointed by the CJCC Board
- Veterans Service Officer from each County

Council members may designate another competent person within their agency or department to represent them and vote at Council meetings. If a member designates an alternate to participate permanently in the CJCC, the alternate will be designated in writing and the alternate shall be given decision-making authority, provided that adequate notice of the issues to be discussed at the meeting has been afforded. Distribution of the meeting agenda in accordance with these by-laws shall be deemed adequate notice.

### **Section B: Membership Duties:**

It shall be each member's responsibility to:

- A. Attend and actively participate at meetings;
- B. Be informed on and prepared to discuss matters coming before the CJCC;
- C. Bring forward issues or strategies for discussion and consideration;
- D. Collaborate with other members on improvements to the system;
- E. Serve on subcommittees when appointed;
- F. Communicate changes in agency policies and procedures that may impact the system;
- G. Participate in the implementation and assessment of strategies or programs as approved by the CJCC, to the extent that such participate does not conflict with the best interests of the members' constituency or agency;
- H. Develop data driven policies and evidence- based practices.

### **Section C: Subcommittees/Work Groups**

The CJCC Chair or Vice-Chair upon consensus of the council may designate such temporary subcommittees and work-groups as deemed necessary and advisable to carry out its mission. These committees or work-groups may include but are not limited to the following:

CJS Steering Committee – This subcommittee shall address CJS case processing and other policy and procedures between the CJCC partners and bring back recommendations to the Council.

## **Section D: Compensation**

Members serving on the Council or any sub-committee shall not receive any per diem compensation or reimbursement for mileage or meal expenses for meeting attendance.

## **Article IV: Officers**

### **Section A: Officers**

The CJCC shall elect at the first meeting of the year a Chair, a Vice Chair, a Secretary and a Treasurer for a term of one-year. The officers shall serve until the next Council election or as needed due to the vacancy of any office. Officers may be re-elected. A permanent member of the CJCC shall hold the office of Chair and Vice-Chair. At the option of the CJCC, one person may hold the office of Secretary and Treasurer, designated the Secretary-Treasurer.

### **Section B: Duties of Officers**

The Chair shall preside at all meetings. The Vice-Chair shall preside in the absence of the Chair. The Chair may establish or appointment committees, work groups or task forces as deemed necessary by the CJCC.

### **Section C: Removal of Officers**

Any officer elected or appointed by the Council may be removed for cause by the Council by two-thirds of the members present at a scheduled Council meeting.

### **Section D: Vacancies**

A vacancy in any office because of death, resignation, removal, disqualification or other reason shall be filled by holding a special election at the next regular scheduled meeting.

## **Article V: Meetings**

1. Meetings of the CJCC shall be set by the Council, the Chair, or upon petition by any four members of the Council. Notice meeting times and locations shall be provided to all members. The Chairperson may cancel or reschedule a general meeting. Members will be notified by the most expedient means available.
2. Minutes of the Council meetings shall be recorded and distributed to all members of the Council.
3. At least 33% of the membership must be present to establish a quorum. Any action requires a simple majority vote of the membership present. A quorum is not required for subcommittee meetings and any decision within subcommittees shall be made by a simple majority vote of those present.

4. Video conferences, teleconferences, online conferences or other such electronic methods may be utilized for the conduct of a general meeting or special called meeting. Members appearing via video conferences are eligible to vote on issues.
5. The CJCC meetings shall be subject to the Open Meetings Law and shall comply with such Laws.

**Article VI: Fiscal Year**

The fiscal year of the CJCC shall be the calendar year.

**Article VII: Conflict of Interest**

Any council member who is present at a meeting at which any matter discussed in which he or she has a private interest, directly or indirectly, shall declare that he or she has a potential conflict. He or she shall refrain from attempting to influence the decisions of other members of the governing body in voting on the matter and shall not vote in respect to such matter.

**Article VIII: Change in By-Laws**

These by-laws may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of the members present at any meeting of the members at which a quorum is present. Notice of any amendment to be offered at any meeting shall be given not less than 7 nor more than 30 days before such meeting and shall set forth such amendment.

- Citizen representative from each county, appointed by the CJCC Board
- Wisconsin Works, private social service, mental health and substance abuse agencies serving the two counties
- Representative from U.W. Madison Division of Extension
- Former offender, *appointed by the CJCC Board*
- Veterans Service Officer from each County

Whereas the CJCC would have such other authority as granted by its Bylaws, and;

Whereas the CJCC shall report back to the Law Enforcement Committee of each County;



NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Buffalo County Board of Supervisors, in conjunction with the Pepin County Board of Supervisors, hereby replaces the original Resolution creating the Buffalo Pepin Criminal Justice Coordinating Council with the mission and initial membership as described above for the Buffalo Pepin Criminal Justice Collaborating Council.

FURTHER RESOLVED Pepin County will serve as the fiscal agent for the Buffalo Pepin Criminal Justice Collaborating Council.

In the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter of 2022 (reporting because I have been away from the last few meetings), the following eight teleconference classes from the Dunn County Jail have been offered: Adulting, Breaking Barriers, Coping with Anger (MRT), Parenting with Love and Logic, Socialization, Staying Quit (MRT), and Stop the Chaos. Participant numbers (some repeats for those enrolled in multiple classes) were: Buffalo County Jail: 10 men, 5 women; Pepin County Jail: 5 men; 2 women, for a total of 22 participating in classes. One man participated in the Literacy Link Making Reading Memories program and was recorded reading books for his children three times, with a total of 5 books and recordings sent to the children/family.

Five teleconference classes are being offered in July. They include: Change Company, Music Therapy, Relationships, Socialization, and Staying Quit (MRT). There are no Pepin County participants in July. Buffalo County participants are: BC Jail (with repeats for those enrolled in multiple classes): 4 women and 10 men; CJS Program: 1 woman, for a total of 14 participating in classes.

No activity with the Certified Recover/Reentry Peer Specialist has taken place since March. Working to resume offering in July-August, as well as resuming The Literacy Link Program variety of strategies, namely Making Reading Memories and Parent Coaching.
