Committee/Board: Agriculture and Extension Education Subcommittee

Date of Meeting: Monday, April 6, 2026

The meeting was called to order by Chair, Brian Michaels at 9:53 a.m.

Board Members Present: Mr. Brian Michaels, Mr. Robert Sendelbach and Mr. Gary Stanton

Public comments Regarding Posted Agenda Items: None

Review/Discussion/Action ~ Minutes of the previous meeting: Motion by Mr. Stanton, seconded by Mr. Sendelbach to approve the minutes from the previous meeting. Motion carried.

Review/Discussion/Action ~ Regional Crop Educator Hiring Update: Dr. Weiss reported that preliminary interviews for 6 candidates were conducted on April 1. Ms. Sarah Torbert, the hiring agent, informed Dr. Weiss that the selection committee chose 4 candidates to move forward to final interviews. Final interviews will be held on April 15th with all committee members/administration invited to listen to the presentations of each candidate. More information and the remote access link will be available soon.

Review/Discussion/Action ~ Personnel Update: Dr. Weiss updated the committee on the hiring of Bianca Mullen as the 4-H Associate Educator. As a result of Ms. Mullen moving into the educator position, there is a vacancy for the .5% 4-H Assistant position which is included in the 2026 budget. After conversation with administration, she is hoping to move forward with hiring for that position. Dr. Weiss shared that she would like to use funds from the Teen Court non-lapsing account to supplement the position and bring it to a possible .6%. This would allow additional support for the Buffalo/Pepin County Teen Court program currently housed in Pepin County. The committee supported that decision.

Dr. Weiss also shared that the 4-H Leaders Association is donating funds up to \$6000 for a 4-H Summer Intern. The summer intern position is currently posted and will close on April 24th. She is hoping to have an intern in place by mid to late May.

Educator Reports:

Human Development and Family Relations: Ms. Mary Wood, HDR Educator, discussed the following:

- Successes and challenges collaborating with Trempealeau County Jail for Moving Forward re-entry classes which serve both men and women.

- Noted some delays in the hiring of an AmeriCorps recovery coach. This leads to concerns about losing funding secured in 2025 for this position. Several attempts have been made to hold discussions but have been unable to coordinate with Trempealeau Jail staff.
- 26 participants in Trempealeau Jail re-entry classes in March.
- The recent Companions Through the Wilderness, Healing from Loss and Greif classes went very well with participants asking to continue to meet monthly. Ms. Wood shared a link for committee members to view evaluations of the class.
- Discussed the Strong Couples program.
- Provided updates on statewide classes and learning opportunities.
- Planning to conduct a Child Care Clinic at Cochrane-Fountain City School.

4-H Youth Development: Ms. Weisenbeck reported on recent 4-H Youth Development programming in the absence of Bianca Mullen, 4-H Associate Educator.

- 4-H Countywide Service-Learning opportunity: Connections Across Generations is a service project for 4-H clubs to promote intergenerational connections as well as aligning with community needs. Ms. Mullen designed the program with interactive guidelines to ensure educational and impactful outcomes.
- Attended the Early Childhood Screening Event at Alma Area Schools creating connections with youth and families as well as leadership opportunities for an older youth member.
- Discussed the 4-H STEM Discovery Toolkits, including the new projects and materials being added. Explained how the Toolkits are being promoted on social media and featured at 4-H Leaders' Association meetings to increase awareness among the public and 4-H Leaders about the resources available to them.
- 2026 Thriving Survey Results: The findings reflect a strong 4-H program in Buffalo County with 4-H enrollment continuing a consistent trend to the positive.
- Dr. Weiss also shared collaboration with Pierce County 4-H planning day/overnight camps at Nugget Lake Park as well as STEAM Discovery Days for MCYC youth.
- Upcoming programs:
 - 4-H Dog Project Fun Day
 - Nature Quest at Merrick State Park
 - Math & Science night at C-FC

Soils and Crops: No Report. Vacant position.

Area Extension Director Report: Dr. Weiss explained while working with the 4-H Regional Program manager that a focus of Ms. Mullen's work will include 4-H Volunteer training. This will allow 4-H Volunteers to become more involved and confident in teaching young people and be able to assist more with future programs.. She also spoke about her meeting and discussions with the Mondovi Community Youth Center board and potential 4-H programming for this summer and beyond.

Weiss also discussed the 136 Contract with the university for educator's salaries. She explained to the committee the approximate savings to the county due to the vacant

positions during the first quarter of 2026. Depending on start dates of the new hires, there is potential for a \$22,000 deduction of the original contracted amount. That will be calculated and applied on the second invoice from the University issued in November.

Committee Chair Report: No report by Mr. Michaels. Mr. Engfer stated there would be reorganization of the Ag and Extension Education Sub Committee after elections. The annual report was discussed and will be presented to the new committee at the next meeting.

PURPOSE:

We teach, learn, lead and serve, connecting people with the University of Wisconsin, and engaging with them in transforming lives and communities.

Introductory statement:

The UW-Madison, Division of Extension in Buffalo County saw many transitions in 2025. Additionally, so did the organization as a whole. Buffalo County's Extension office saw a committed stalwart, Annie Lisowski, transition out of her educator role into a state role as of April. The position was left vacated after 2 failed searches until February of 2026 when Bianca Mullen assumed those duties. Likewise, Steve Okonek's departure from his Crops and Soils position as of November 2024 left another vacuum. With additional leaves and shared positions with other counties (Pepin), the office was often quiet. Yet, the work that could continue, did, as this report indicates. With a small but mighty crew programming continued throughout the county.

Additionally, Extension felt many changes. With federal budget cuts specific to Extension (the elimination of FoodWise) or to the University, Extension took measures to correct and absorb the cuts either through reductions, realignment or operations. However, the organization can commit to these two points going forward:

1. We are committed to the county-based educator model.
2. The organization will not pass this loss of funding off onto our county partners.

In 2025, a milestone was crossed of more than **1,000** Buffalo and Pepin County residents and their families have completed **A Better Beginning** 2-part court-ordered class since it was first developed in 2025. On short and long-term evaluations, participants report lower overall family stress and conflict, improved co-parenting relationships, and stronger parent-child relationships. Frequently, parents report wishing they wish that they would have learned some of the communication and relationship skills much sooner and they

might not be getting divorced. To that end, another educational program that I have brought to Wisconsin and Buffalo County is the **Strong Couples Program** which has been shown to increase couple satisfaction and likelihood of strong, lasting relationships, as well as improved mental and physical health, and reduce alcohol misuse, and levels of stress and family conflict.



MOVING FORWARD Jail Reentry Program – It has been shown that people who receive education and support while incarcerated and during the post-release period are less likely to re-offend and return to or remain in the justice system AND that their children are less likely to enter the juvenile justice system. In 2025, we offered **65** classes ranging from 4 to 12 sessions to **191** learners in Buffalo, Trempealeau and Pepin County jails, or Community Justice/Probation supervision, and the services from an AmeriCorps Recovery Coach. Class topics include: recovery, addiction, sobriety, mental health, positive social supports, relationships, parenting, workforce

readiness, financial management, community supports, etc. This program is supported by a UW Reilly-Baldwin UW Wisconsin Idea Foundation Grant, in close collaboration with the Dunn County Jail. NOTE: A considerable challenge to program continuation and delivery has been presented by the decision in 2025 to house Buffalo County inmates in other counties.

Companions Through the Wilderness—This program was offered quarterly in community settings, local jails and a special series for farmers and ag-related individuals during 2025. It is supported by the *Buffalo-Pepin-Trempealeau Hope4U* Mental Health and Suicide Prevention non-profit organization, and the West-Central Regional and Buffalo County Farm Bureau. It has also caught the interest of DATCP and received national recognition.

- Continue providing proven education that supports individuals, couples, children and families to help them thrive across the lifespan and contribute to making Buffalo County a healthy, vibrant and resilient place to live and work.
- Continue leadership that serves individuals and families in their darkest and most difficult times of disruption and adversity such as financial stress, divorce, deployment, incarceration, reentry, and reunification, through education and support, and by promoting policies and systems that align with evidence-based and cost-effective prevention/intervention research and best practice strategies.



Healthy Choices Healthy Lives

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The congressional budget reconciliation bill signed into law on July 4, 2025 ends federal SNAP-Ed funding effective September 30, 2025.

For more than 30 years, UW–Madison Extension has provided local nutrition education across Wisconsin through the federal SNAP-Ed grant program. Working with schools, food pantries, farmers markets, and community centers, FoodWise has taught practical, evidence-based skills in meal planning, food safety, and food resource management, helping people stretch food dollars and make healthier choices.

Extension is currently navigating the difficult process of winding down SNAP-Ed-funded programming. Very limited programming will continue through September 30, 2026.

FoodWise in Buffalo County

- A program for parents and caregivers of Buffalo County Head Start Centers where they learned strategies to include kids in the kitchen. The purpose of this program is to increase healthy food consumption and increase vegetable intake.
- A series of four lessons for 4K school students and 4-year-old Head Start students, where they learned about eating a rainbow of fruits and vegetables. Food tastings were held to mindfully explore foods. The goal of these efforts is to encourage increased vegetable intake among young children.
- A series of six lessons for Gilmanston Middle School Students, where participants learned about eating a variety of foods from MyPlate, specifically fruits and vegetables, dairy, grains and protein, and a focus on decreasing sugars in foods and beverages. The goal of this effort is to encourage healthy habits in school and at home.

Buffalo County 4-H demonstrated resilience and strength in 2025, continuing to deliver meaningful youth development programming despite a year of transition. While the program operated without a dedicated educator for much of the year, outreach and engagement remained strong thanks to committed volunteers, community partners, youth leaders and staff. Programming continued through a variety of opportunities, including project focused program days, travel experiences, leadership development, service-learning projects, and event volunteer development.

Even in the midst of change, Buffalo County 4-H maintained strong engagement. In 2025, **340 youth were enrolled across 11 community 4-H clubs**, reflecting the continued commitment of families and volunteers to the 4-H program and its mission.

Creating a Culture of Belonging

At the heart of 4-H is a commitment to ensuring every young person feels a sense of belonging, that they are welcomed, valued, and supported by caring adults and peers. Buffalo County 4-H strives to create environments where youth feel safe to be themselves, take risks, and grow into confident leaders.

This commitment is reflected in results from the **Wisconsin 4-H Thriving Survey**, a state wide tool used to measure youth experience and program quality. In 2025, Buffalo County achieved an overall score of 5.47 out of 7, which is considered a **high-quality program**. This score indicates that youth in Buffalo County 4-H experience strong relationships, see new possibilities for themselves, and feel encouraged by supportive adults to pursue their goals.

Helping Youth Discover Their SPARKS

A core focus of 4-H is helping youth identify and explore their **“SPARKS”**. These are the passions and interests that motivate them and give them purpose. In 2025 Buffalo County 4-H created new opportunities for youth to explore these sparks through innovative programming.

One highlight was the introduction of 4-H Art Sparks Days where youth engaged in hands-on creative exploration. These programs provided opportunities to :

- Experiment with 3D pens and 3D printers
- Learn sewing and textile skills
- Explore different forms of art and creative expression

Experiences like these allow youth to try new things, build skills, and discover what excites them. When young people are supported in exploring their sparks. They experience greater motivation, confidence, and overall well-being in other areas of their lives.

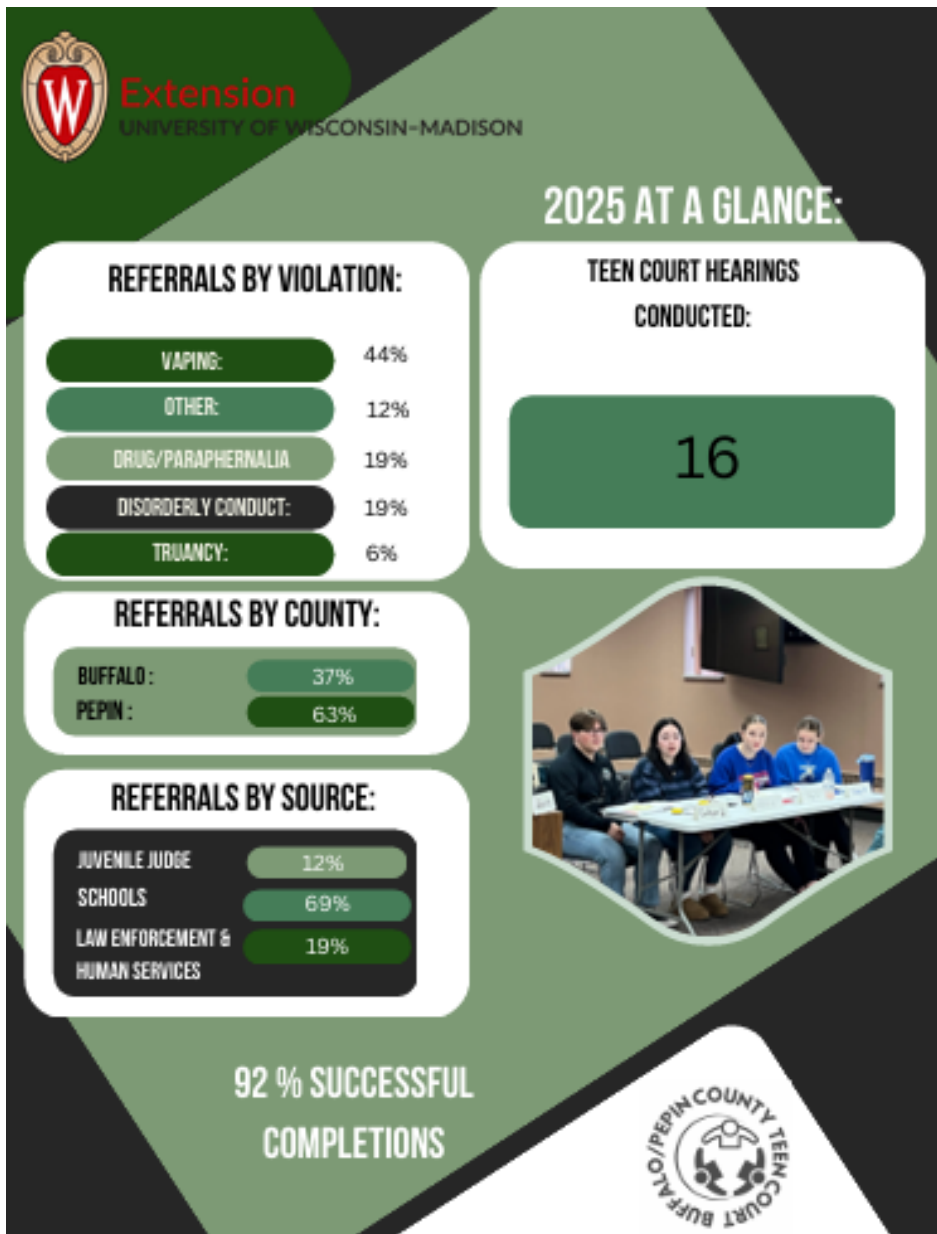

Looking Ahead

Buffalo County 4-H enters the future with a strong foundation built on youth voice, volunteer leadership, and a shared commitment to belonging. In the coming year, the program plans to deepen collaboration with community partners and further leverage the talents and expertise of local volunteers and residents. By engaging individuals with diverse skills and experiences, Buffalo County 4-H aims to expose young people to a broader range of opportunities, career pathways, and personal interests. These connections will help youth explore new possibilities, strengthen their sense of purpose, and continue discovering and developing their unique sparks.

Through these efforts, Buffalo County 4-H will continue to provide meaningful experiences where youth feel supported, valued, and inspired to grow as confident leaders in their communities.



Buffalo/Pepin County Teen Court

In 2025, the Buffalo/Pepin County Teen Court program under the guidance of Sky Holt, Pepin County 4-H Educator, conducted **16** hearings with referrals from the juvenile judge, schools, law enforcement, and human services. **92%** of the youth with violations successfully completed their requirements assigned by a team of peer panel members. **49** panel members from six school districts are active members in the program with the training to ask restorative questions of youth and their families. **15** new panel members were trained in April. The purpose of teen court is to provide a restorative justice approach aimed at helping young people rethink their behavior, repair relationships, and restore their image in the community. 2025 Budget Summary

The 2025 budget as depicted with these numbers is indicative of the personnel transitions we experienced. With a transition in both our 4-H and Ag positions, we exhausted only 47% of our contracted services budget line. This is also reflected in our overall expense budget as well. With less staff we had less consumables for programmatic needs. A final note is in our revenues. We had increased revenues due to a grant that came due and was deposited in full (Ag: Crops and Soils). Other contributing revenues included Mary's programmatic fees, ABB classes, and Child Care Clinics or from our farm record book sales.

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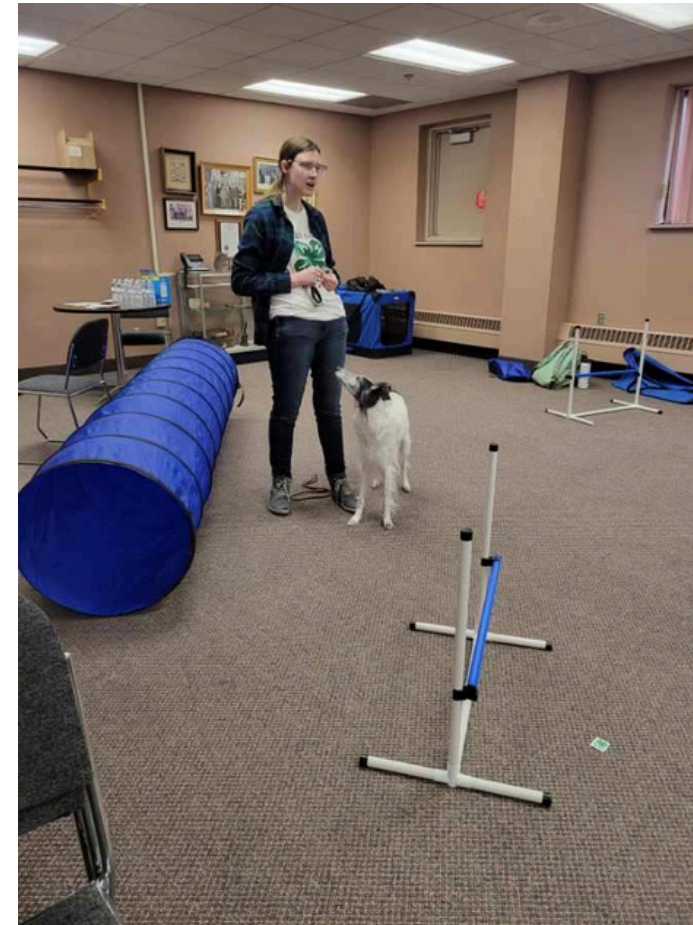

Recent Happenings

Math and Science Night at CFC School – April 16th, 2026: Buffalo County 4-H was pleased to participate in the Math and Science Night held on April 16th at Cochrane-Fountain City (CFC) School. The event featured a variety of engaging, magic-themed stations that provided hands-on learning opportunities for youth and families. At the 4-H station, participants created “potion” sand art, allowing them to explore creativity while engaging in a fun, interactive activity. Youth selected from a variety of colored sands and layered them into small bottles to design their own unique take-home creations. This activity highlighted the 4-H focus on experiential learning through creativity and exploration. The station was facilitated by Bianca Mullen, Associate 4-H Educator, and Stephanie Foust, 4-H Volunteer. Approximately 70 students visited the 4-H station throughout the evening, demonstrating strong interest and engagement. Overall, the event provided a valuable opportunity to connect with youth and promote 4-H programming within the community.



4-H Dog Project Fun Day – April 18th, 2026: Youth participants gathered for the Paws and Tails: Dog Project Fun Day, an engaging and educational event designed to introduce and highlight the Buffalo County 4-H Dog Project. The program began with hands-on learning led by Buffalo County 4-H Dog Project leaders Sam and Kim, who provided valuable insight into dog training and project involvement. Sam’s dog, Mimic, played a key role in demonstrating essential dog project skills, including agility and rallying. Participants observed training techniques in action and gained practical tips for working with their own dogs at home. Youth also had the unique opportunity to interact directly with Mimic during portions of the demonstrations, enhancing their understanding through experiential learning. In addition to dog-focused activities, participants engaged in creative, hands-on projects. Youth designed personalized dog tags using the Buffalo County metal stamping STEM toolkit and constructed dog toys from recycled t-shirts, incorporating elements of both creativity and sustainability. Throughout the event, participants asked thoughtful questions, expanded their knowledge of the dog project, and expressed increased interest in future involvement. The Dog Project Fun Day successfully combined education, skill-building, and creativity, providing a positive introduction to 4-H project opportunities and encouraging continued engagement.



Earth Day Event at YMCA Camp Pepin – April 22nd: Pepin County Land Conservation hosted a successful Earth Day educational event for junior high students at YMCA Camp Pepin, providing hands-on learning experiences focused on

environmental stewardship and conservation. Approximately 160 students from Pepin County schools attended the event, participating in a variety of interactive, outdoor learning stations designed to build awareness and understanding of natural resource conservation. Buffalo County 4-H collaborated with Pepin County 4-H to support a shared learning station featuring a “Recycling Minute to Win It” activity. The event demonstrated the value of strong community partnerships and cross-county collaboration in delivering high-quality educational programming. It also provided a meaningful opportunity to connect with youth and promote 4-H’s role in supporting hands-on, experiential learning.



Upcoming Buffalo County 4-H Programs!

4-H Nature Quest Day at Merrick State Park – June 10th:

4-H Nature Quest will offer youth a hands-on outdoor learning experience at Merrick State Park. This event will include shoreline fishing, pollinator education with butterfly house building, a trail scavenger hunt, and a live raptor program with River Valley Raptors. We are collaborating with Merrick State Park, River Valley Raptors, and Buffalo County Land Conservation to provide high-quality environmental education and outdoor learning stations. The event will also include a free meal, sponsored by the Buffalo County 4-H Leaders Association.

4-H Cloverbud Exploration Day Camp at Nugget Lake – June 16th: Buffalo, Pierce, and Pepin County 4-H will host the Cloverbud Exploration Day Camp on June 16, 2026, at Nugget Lake County Park. Designed for youth in 5K–2nd grade, this program offers hands-on outdoor activities that encourage curiosity, exploration, and learning through play. Participants will rotate through engaging stations, including activities like pop-can fishing, while building connections with nature in a supportive environment. Registration closes June 1, and the program aims to provide a fun and welcoming introduction to 4-H for younger youth.

4-H STEAM Adventure Days – June 26th and July 10th: Buffalo County 4-H will host STEAM Adventure Days on June 26 and July 10, 2026, at the Mondovi Arboretum. Open to youth entering 5K–6th grade, this program offers hands-on, interactive sessions focused on science, technology, engineering, arts, and math. Participants will engage in creative, age-appropriate activities that promote curiosity, problem-solving, and collaboration. Registration closes June 12.

4-H Outdoor Explorers: Nugget Lake – July 14th- 15th: The 4-H Outdoor Explorers: Nugget Lake Day Camp will be held July 14–15, 2026, at Nugget Lake County Park. Designed for youth in grades 3–6, this two-day camp offers hands-on outdoor experiences that encourage exploration, skill-building, and teamwork. Participants will take part in activities such as canoeing, fishing, hiking, group games, and arts and crafts while building friendships and confidence in an outdoor setting. Registration closes July 1.
